Hearts on Fire

Vincentian volunteers take seriously that challenge to offer compassion and mercy to those who have fallen on hard times and grown discouraged. Through the personal encounter of the Home Visit, the hallmark activity of the Society's ministry, two Vincentians listen to the neighbors' life stories and approach their circumstances empathetically. It is through this faceto-face interaction, in a place where the neighbors can feel most comfortable, that the Vincentian pair creates a space for hope. Many Vincentians admit that the experience can be transformational for all involved and motivates them to continue with the ministry for years.

MaryJo, a Vincentian from our Nassau South District, expressed the impact of the ministry on her and husband, Neil, in this way: "...unfortunately, there are so many people that are out there struggling on their own...it has made us a lot more grateful for the life that we have, and is teaching us how to help others and be more giving of ourselves." Neil went on to share enthusiastically, "I think it's one of the best things we've ever done!" Their hearts are truly on fire to share the love of Christ!

The Diocesan Council of Rockville Centre serves 68 communities across Long Island with over 1100 active Vincentian volunteers like MaryJo and Neil. Our Rule, Part 1, 2.6 states,

"The Vincentian vocation affects all aspects of members' daily lives, making them more sensitive and caring in their family, work and leisure activities."

Once a member goes through formation, experiences a few home visits, and provides an opportunity for a neighbor to be heard and understood, the Vincentian's lens in which to view society and its challenges is forever changed. By going in twos, this vocation replicates what Jesus' disciples did and brings the Good News to others, making a significant difference in the lives of those we serve.

Our Neighbors: A Single Dad's Story

You know that SVDPLI helps thousands of people each year, doing so for over 75 years. Countless tales of adversity exist, often resulting over time, thankfully, in hope and a better life. We could share innumerable stories that are the reason why so many support our good works. With the help of people like our Vincentians and supporters talking about the renewal we provide, we pray even more will join in giving.

This year we have a very poignant neighbor story to share of a single father who, with "divine guidance" in a moment of despair found a local parish and SVDPLI, both of whom embraced him and his family.

Paul is an "older" single father. He has 2 adult children from his first marriage and from his second, 3 beautiful young daughters under the age of 7. When his second wife left, he became the sole caregiver and provider for these children. Paul, a hardworking tradesman, was now faced with many emotional and financial difficulties: Who would care for his children while he worked? How would he eventually get them off to school and still be at work on time? How would he provide financially for them and all their needs going forward? Taking a circuitous route home from work one day, while reflecting on the challenges ahead of him, Paul turned down a road he had never taken before. As he came to a red light, he saw an unfamiliar Catholic church to his left and felt compelled by the Holy Spirit to pull into the parking lot and seek help. Upon entering the Rectory, he met the parish assistant and basically "let loose" his story to her. In her deep compassion, she listened, offered immediate help and led him to our Parish Conference. Through SVDPLI, Paul received some needed financial support, clothing



for the children and routinely visits the food pantry. While not solving all his problems, pulling into that church lot, meeting parish staff and members of the Conference, Paul told us, has changed his life. He now considers the parish and SVDPLI his family.

Paul started bringing his daughters to mass with plans on baptizing them; Sunday mass he feels is the best preparation for this sacrament. He told us a wonderful story about attending mass on a recent Sunday. Paul's 2-year-old was a typical toddler during the service—she was being antsy, crying, etc. While he was having trouble keeping her from disrupting the service, made more difficult by the fact that they sit in the front of church, the priest giving his homily walked by their pew. As this happened, the child quieted down and reached out her arms to the priest. He took her, held her while offering the rest of the homily and she was quiet and at peace! Once again, Paul felt the Holy Spirit work through his connection to the church and to SVDPLI in keeping his daughter calm. He feels blessed, he tells us, to be part of this new family. We say that we are equally blessed to have him and his daughters as part of ours! See the actual picture above!

Donated clothing is sold in the stores or given to neighbors who, when home visits reveal the need for clothing, receive them from the stores. A great deal of furniture is sold at the stores but is also available at no cost to neighbors who apply for help through our Conferences. Store sales help to sustain the cycle of support needed to fund our programs, while providing exceptional deals for customers. Central Council, our stores and our Conferences work together in beautiful harmony to change and improve lives!



We Love Our Donors!

YES, WE TRULY LOVE OUR DONORS! Without you, we clearly could not exist. "For-Profit" companies can develop new high profit margin goods or raise capital for product research. At SVDPLI, we can only endure through the generosity of the people who consistently support us and shop our stores. It is just that simple—we have no profit margins, no shares of stock to sell! We assist people struggling financially, we provide clothing, furniture and home goods to those who cannot afford it. And we offer the same hope and love St. Vincent de Paul extended his neighboring poor over 400 years ago.

The struggles of disadvantaged neighbors have skyrocketed in recent years. From a world not fully recovered from the pandemic to global instability, inflation, etc., we need help now more than ever. In 2023, we witnessed a sharp 22% increase in assistance requests, with an unprecedented 56% more coming online, further impacting our ability to help. For this reason, it is imperative for each of us reading this to talk with others about supporting SVDPLI on a regular basis.

The best way to help others is through Monthly Giving. It is the lifeline that sustains SVDPLI with a vital, steady stream of income to foster a closer relationship between donors and those we serve. See the sidebar for more info.

SVDPLI made the difficult decision to close Dismas House, our transitional housing program, late in 2023. Among the outgoing monthly donors to Dismas is Mary Ellen Lyons, a generous benefactor for almost 2 decades. Connecting with her recently, we advised about the closing and thanked her for her sustained support. Upon discussing the status of her monthly gift, without hesitation Mary Ellen said she would continue to support SVDPLI and now direct her recurring gift to our mission. She genuinely believes in what we do and will continue subsidizing our good works wherever they may be. She knows her donations will still go to help people on Long Island and that is part of her philanthropic plan. When asked why she gives recurringly, Mary Ellen said, "I donate monthly because I want to ensure that my charity donations are not a question for me. I set up automated payments just as I pay all my bills. It is so easy and it is part of my budget." Besides the good that Mary Ellen knows will be done for others, she perfectly explained the dual benefit of monthly giving, the key to our future sustainability.

Among its many benefits:




